

ARE TOMATOES POISONOUS TO DONKEYS AND HORSES?

Can you tell me if tomato plants pose any hazard to donkeys? There is a wire mesh fence between my garden and my donkey pasture, but as you know, donkeys regard any barrier as a challenge to try whatever is on the other side.



Fruits such as tomatoes, which are healthy and enjoyable for us, actually pose a threat for horses and donkeys. The tomato plant is part of the Solanaceae plant family, which is toxic and includes potatoes, deadly nightshade, and horse nettle (referred to as wild tomato). The leafy and green portions of the tomato plants contain atropine, which slows the gut of the horse down. This causes colic in equids, which can be lethal. Hyoscyamine, also present in these plants, affects the nervous system. Hence, there

is a decrease in saliva production, a decrease in the motility of the intestines and increased heart rate is also observed. The pupils begin to dilate as well. The hyoscyamine also has a direct effect on the digestive system, causing the equid to experience colic, as previously stated, constipation, and/or hemorrhagic diarrhea.

If the animal is displaying signs of muscle tremors, dilated pupils, and decreased intestinal motility, the animal may be treated with physostigmine. If the animal has been found right after the plants have been consumed, one may also orally administer activated charcoal, which will act as an adsorbent.


If adequate amounts of forage and well-maintained grass are available for them to eat, your donkeys should not consume any poisonous plants. During periods of drought, though, when lush grass may not be available for consumption, they may eat these normally unpalatable plants. To ensure that your donkey does not eat the tomatoes just make sure there is plenty of other grass or hay to eat. If they have that as an option they should not disturb the tomatoes in the garden.










My friend's horse has a stubborn case of thrush. She has tried numerous products, a prescription from the vet, peroxide, etc. Despite all the different products, and keeping his stall dry, the hooves will not dry out. What is

the best way to eliminate the thrush and prevent its return? Could it be caused by something in the feed, or a vitamin/mineral deficiency?



Thrush is a common infection horses can develop in their hooves under wet conditions. Because thrush is caused by anaerobic bacteria that love moisture, it can be difficult to prevent if a horse does not have some sort of dry footing available to stand on. Other common causes are abnormal hoof growth, poor circulation to the

hoof area and the surrounding tissues, a lack of care or exercise, and poor diet. Symptoms of thrush are a strong odor and a black sticky substance in the hoof.

Thrush is easily treatable, but success depends on how early the infection is caught. One popular treatment for mild cases recommends packing the hoof with sugardine at least once a day and keeping the horse's footing as dry as possible. Sugardine is a mixture of 10% povidone iodine and sugar. Use double the amount of sugar than liquid to create a paste. Many people have success with sugardine because it does not damage the healthy tissue that remains on the infected hoof. It also helps draw the infection to the surface more easily and allows the hoof to harden again. Using a diluted bleach solution several times a week can help treat mild cases as well as prevent thrush from coming back but care should be taken to not get the bleach on the horse's skin or coronary band. If a case is serious enough it is suggested that a farrier remove all of the infected or soft tissue and then treat the area with an antibiotic prescribed by a veterinarian and wrap the entire foot.

In extremely stubborn cases, determining if the horse is getting proper nutrition can assist in solving the thrush problem. There is really no one vitamin or mineral deficiency that leads to thrush, but poor nutrition in general is damaging to hooves. Biotin, a water-soluble B vitamin, can help with dry, cracked, or tender hooves and bad-conditioned feet. Many horses may benefit from biotin supplementation, although deficiencies in biotin are rare. Biotin can be found in high concentrations in alfalfa, in slightly lower concentrations in oat, barley and soybean meal, and in lower concentrations in corn.

Other nutrients that are important for hoof health include zinc (for keeping the immune system strong), manganese (for the composition of the skeleton), copper (for bone and connective tissue formation) and vitamins A and D (for bone reabsorption and the properly regulating calcium and phosphorus).



Eastern Equine Encephalitis and YOU

Eastern Equine Encephalitis Fact Sheet

Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) is a mosquito-borne viral disease. EEE virus (EEEV) occurs in the eastern half of the United States where it causes disease in humans, horses, and some bird species. Because of the high mortality rate, EEE is regarded as one of the most serious mosquito-borne diseases in the United States.

TRANSMISSION: What is the basic EEEV transmission cycle? How do people become infected with EEEV?

- EEEV is transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. It generally takes from 3 to 10 days to develop symptoms of EEE after being bitten by an infected mosquito.
- The main EEEV transmission cycle is between birds and mosquitoes.
- Many species of mosquitoes can become infected with EEEV. The most important mosquito species in maintaining the bird-mosquito transmission cycle is *Culiseta melanura*, which reproduces in freshwater hardwood swamps. *Culiseta melanura*, however, is not considered to be an important vector of EEEV to horses or humans because it feeds almost exclusively on birds. Transmission to horses or humans requires mosquito species capable of creating a "bridge" between infected birds and uninfected mammals such as some *Aedes*, *Coquillettidia*, and *Culex* species.
- Horses are susceptible to EEE and some cases are fatal. EEEV infections in horses, however, are not a significant risk factor for human infection because horses are considered to be "dead-end" hosts for the virus (i.e., the amount of EEEV in their bloodstreams is usually insufficient to infect mosquitoes).

ETIOLOGIC AGENT: What causes EEE?

- Eastern equine encephalitis virus is a member of the family Togaviridae, genus *Alphavirus*.
- Closely related to Western equine encephalitis virus and Venezuelan equine encephalitis virus

HUMAN CLINICAL FEATURES: What type of illness can occur?

- Many persons infected with EEEV have no apparent illness. In those persons who do develop illness, symptoms range from mild flu-like illness to EEE (inflammation of the brain), coma and death.
- The mortality rate from EEE is approximately one-third, making it one of the most deadly mosquito-borne diseases in the United States.
- There is no specific treatment for EEE; optimal medical care includes hospitalization and supportive care (for example, expert nursing care, respiratory support, prevention of secondary bacterial infections, and physical therapy, depending on the situation).
- Approximately half of those persons who survive EEE will have mild to severe permanent neurologic damage.

INCIDENCE: How many and where have human EEE cases occurred?

- Approximately 220 confirmed cases in the US 1964-2004
- Average of 5 cases/year, with a range from 0-15 cases
- States with largest number of cases are Florida, Georgia, Massachusetts, and New Jersey.
- EEEV transmission is most common in and around freshwater hardwood swamps in the Atlantic and Gulf Coast states and the Great Lakes region.
- Human cases occur relatively infrequently, largely because the primary transmission cycle takes place in and around swampy areas where human populations tend to be limited.

RISK GROUPS: Who is at risk for developing EEE?

- Residents of and visitors to endemic areas(areas with an established presence of the virus)
- People who engage in outdoor work and recreational activities in endemic areas
- Persons over age 50 and younger than age 15 seem to be at greatest risk for developing severe EEE when infected with the virus.

PREVENTION: How can people avoid EEEV infection?

- A vaccine is available to protect equines.
- People should avoid mosquito bites by employing personal and household protection measures, such as using an EPA-registered repellent according to manufacturers' instructions, wearing protective clothing, avoiding outdoor activity when mosquitoes are active (some bridge vectors of EEEV are aggressive day-biters), and removing standing water that can provide mosquito breeding sites. For more information about preventing mosquito-borne disease see • Preventing West Nile Virus.

LABORATORY TESTING:

- The cornerstone of laboratory diagnosis of EEEV infection is serology, especially IgM testing of serum and cerebrospinal fluid (CSF), and neutralizing antibody testing of acute- and convalescent-phase serum.
- In fatal cases, however, PCR, histopathology with immunohistochemistry, and virus culture of autopsy tissues continue to be useful. Only a few state laboratories or other specialized laboratories, including those at CDC, are capable of doing this specialized testing.

IMMUNITY:

• EEEV infection is thought to confer life-long immunity against reinfection with EEEV. It does not confer any significant crossimmunity against other alphaviruses (e.g., Western equine encephalitis virus), and it confers no cross-immunity against flaviviruses (e.g., West Nile virus) or bunyaviruses (e.g., La Crosse virus)

SURVEILLANCE: How is EEE monitored?

- Human EEE cases are reportable by state health departments to CDC via ArboNET. Reports of infected horses, mosquitoes, and birds are also collected by ArboNET
- National human EEE case report data for

 <u>2004</u> are posted on this website, by state, as is a
 <u>map</u> of
 reported human cases from 1964-2004.

TRENDS

• Risk of exposure to EEEV-infected mosquitoes may increase as the human population expands into natural areas where the virus circulates (e.g., near hardwood, freshwater swamps in the eastern and north-central United States).

CHALLENGES

- No human EEEV vaccine is currently licensed and it is unlikely that one will be available in the foreseeable future.
- No specific drug treatment for EEE is available.
- Control measures for EEEV are challenging and expensive. For example, laws for the protection of wetlands limit efforts to eliminate some swamps or to treat them with mosquito larvicides or aerial insecticides; in some regions, there is a lack of public support for use of insecticides to reduce populations of mosquitoes that transmit EEEV or other mosquito-borne viruses.

RESEARCH PRIORITIES

- Improve predictive capabilities
- Improve public awareness
- Develop and evaluate therapeutic drugs
- Improve diagnostic and virus detection tests

If I hadn't rescued him, today that old pony would not be alive! Time has turned his black coat gray and he's not considered "a pretty face!"


But small children beg to ride HIM, not a unicorn. It's odd but always the case!!!

Horseback Safaris - Standard one-hour, two-hour, or threehour horseback safaris are available daily. Horseback Safaris can be arranged for riders with varying levels of experience. All guests should be



at least 12 years of age; 10 years of age is an acceptable age with proven riding experience. Guests weighing more than 275 pounds will need to be assessed by our Equestrian Director before they are allowed to take a Horseback Safari. Call-in reservations are recommended in order to assure that we and our horses are ready for you.

Another favorite is similar, but shorter - an Overnight Trail Ride Safari combined with a next-day "Rawhide Roundup." More time is spent riding the wilderness trails of Forever Florida and learning about nature, less on cowpoke skills.
